PRESIDENT'S YEAR IN REVIEW

This year has shown the great strength of the Altona Hockey Club community. The first year in memory that we have not competed in the winter hockey season in Victoria but also a year that has challenged everyone in Victoria and around the world in many ways.

It has definitely been a turbulent first year to be President, but I am honoured to hold this position and look forward to what we will be able to achieve as a club in the coming years.

Even without hockey, 2020 was not without its successes. We have a facility development section in this report for the first time providing an exciting update on the pavilion - a report I encourage you to read - thanks to the great work of David Burns and Steve Ritchie working with council over many years. We signed Zac Hawes as Men's Premier League coach early this year on a multiple year deal thanks to the tireless work of Ben Guy in this area. Our Women's Premier League coaching group of Ben Newell and Merryn Brennan were once again leading a strong womens section. Hookin2Hockey in late 2019 and early 2020 had great numbers of new kids. We were successful in multiple grant applications, and were involved in multiple Hobsons Bay programs. All the way through to the huge success of the Perfect Harmony Coterie Group this year which saw a large number of members supporting the AHC financially in a tough year.

CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE

For all of the work that went into the year, by far the most went into the Coronavirus Response. From very early on, the AHC took a leadership position as it was becoming apparent the seriousness of the Coronavirus, postponing our \$2,000 Draw and practice matches prior to the government imposed restrictions to ensure the safety of all members and the community.

At this point we formed 3 Coronavirus Response Groups, one responsible for information sharing and ensuring we met all of the latest requirements, one group looking at the financial impact, and one group looking at club & member engagement. I would like to thank everyone who was a part of these groups - all Board Members volunteered, as well as Ben Guy, Ben Newell, Merryn Brennan, Morris Burgess, Zac Hawes, Justine Cooke, Graham Norman, Jodie Ryan, Kerrie Myyrylainen, Caleb Scanlon and Bronte Kerley.

There was a huge amount of work that went into getting the players back onto the pitch in the middle of the year, and I am extremely proud of the way that all members handled the limitations and restrictions, with all players and coaches taking them very seriously from maintaining 1.5m space for weeks at training, to checking in and out of all sessions.

Lastly, we were in a stable cash position thanks to the great management of previous AHC Boards, so we were able to offer a full refund to any members who had paid fees, and any who did not opt for a refund we will carry over to 2021.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Stephen Ritchie who has done an outstanding job as President for the past 2 years, and continued on the board this year for support and experience and will be stepping down at the end of 2020 after a long tenure. And of course to the Board and the work of all volunteers throughout the year which have ensured the operation of the club.

In what has been a very difficult year for all members, the club's board has continued to work around the challenges and progress on some important initiatives throughout the year. Our full compliment of 10 board members still met monthly, switching to virtual meetings with minimal disruption. In fact, we have agreed to continue this practice (where possible) in future to make meetings more accessible for those with competing commitments and travel.

We held 10 regular meetings, board member attendance being:

At an administrative level, we have been successfully reaccredited as a level 3 Good Sports club. Our Club policies are being progressively reviewed and updated to align with evolving HV and HA requirements.

Over the past year the board approached the continuing uncertainty of the Covid pandemic by establishing 3 more frequently meeting working groups to; 1: ensure we were staying on top of developing news and direction from HV, HA and Hobsons Bay City Council; 2: Carefully assessing the financial impact on club operations; and 3: maintaining member engagement.

Whilst all board members played an active role here, I have to highlight the incredible contribution of our President, Alex Tyrrell, who was simply outstanding in his commitment to organise, communicate, engage and, above all, lead throughout uncertainty and dramatically changing times. Its been amazing to observe and learn from him - he has the gratitude and appreciation of all of us who have an insight into what he has done this year.

MEMBERSHIP SUMMARY

The 2020 numbers below are reflective of the cancelled season, but also the fact that we had a junior registration night prior to the lockdown commencing, so majority of the registered members were juniors and Coterie members.

In 2020 we also had no winter season teams compete, but numbers at training were indicative of a similar membership and team total to 2019 had the season commenced. The League Entry Criteria was also removed for the 2020 season.

It is with a sense of cautious optimism that I provide this update to the AHC membership. After many years of consultation with Council and several sports precinct development strategies, we have now been contacted by HBCC to commence planning for the AHC pavilion upgrade project.

The pavilion upgrade project has been a key feature of the AHC strategic plan for many years. Over my time on the board we have independently had provisional planning documents drafted to support discussions with Council and unsuccessfully lobbied for the upgrade project in several budget cycles. The pavilion upgrade was also the reason behind the commencement of the ASF sports fund, which has generated a significant funding source through tax-deductible donations over the past 8 years.

In late 2019, we were approached by HBCC to start some preliminary discussions about the pavilion upgrade project. This has progressed in 2020, when we have provided more detailed information that describes the current and future requirements for our club moving forward. While no definite timeline has been set, we expect that this is the beginning of the planning process which would ideally see a budget submission going to Council to seek funds for a design phase to commence in the next budget cycle.

While it has been a long and sometimes frustrating journey to arrive at this point, the long lead time has yielded a number of benefits, including:

We have accrued enough savings through the ASF to put forward a sizeable contribution to the project which will strengthen a budget bid and give us some say in the outcome.

We have had time to consider what we need from a redevelopment and are now well placed to put forward reasonable requests that will benefit all members.

We have been able to watch and learn from other sports clubs who have undergone similar processes over the journey.

We also know from our discussions with Council that we are extremely lucky to have the facilities that we have and significant capital projects are not easy to come by. Part of the ongoing discussion with Council has been to identify opportunities for the Hobsons Bay community to benefit more broadly from our facilities and it is likely that this will be a feature of the redevelopment project. This may include options for a facility that can accommodate community groups in addition to our requirements. While we do not foresee this will encroach on our use of the facilities, I think it is important for members to be aware that these options are being considered.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Dave Burns for his ongoing commitment in this space and also pass on our gratitude to the HBCC team and our ward councillors who have offered support and guidance throughout the process. Also a huge thanks to all those that have contributed to the ASF over the years, these donations have put us in a great position to take the next step in this process.

We look forward to providing more information as it becomes available.

FINANCIAL REPORT 2020

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2020

Overview

2019-20 was an unusual year all around, including for our club finances. With usual income streams limited, our aim was to minimise expenses as far as possible.


We were able to cope with the inevitable losses due to our strong cash position built up over many years. Based on normal operating income and expenses, we would have recorded a loss of \$38,000.

However, we received nearly \$70,000 in ASF donations throughout the year — resulting from the establishment of a new coaching fund, and changes to the way funds are released to clubs (these are now deposited monthly, rather than at the commencement of a specific ASF project).

The regular ASF revenue is now recorded on our profit and loss statement, thereby creating an overall profit of \$31,790 for the year — a positive result considering the circumstances. However, the full \$70,000 must be set aside for facilities and coaching projects, as per the ASF guidelines.

The charts below show that of our \$120,000 in revenue for the year, \$90,757 has come from donations and fundraising activities.

The small amount of membership income received for the winter season (\$13,340) has either been refunded or marked as individual credits in 2021.





Financial Position (Balance Sheet)

The cash balance at the end of financial year is \$172,053. This covers the sinking fund allocation of \$96,000 for facilities improvements (see 'Reserves — Ground Replacement' in the balance sheet), \$9,000 for our new coaching fund, and approximately four months of expenses (\$15,000 per month on average).

This healthy cash position allowed us to absorb costs throughout the year which were not offset by normal revenue streams (approximately \$25,000). The table below shows the main cash movements between our general account and investment account (for sinking funds).

Our aim is to ensure enough funds in the Bankwest investment account to cover the 'Reserves — Ground Replacement' allocation (currently \$96,000), and now also the donations to our coaching fund (\$9,000). With \$137,000 compared to the required \$105,000, we have again achieved that aim this year.

Income Summary (Profit and Loss)


The result for 2019-20 was a **profit of \$31,790** after interest and depreciation. We originally budgeted for a profit of \$16,000, but this was adjusted to a loss of between \$30,000 and \$40,000 with the cancellation of competition due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The contributions to our ASF fund during the year and the release of those funds to our bank account enabled us to report a profit, rather than the projected loss. We also received some relief from normal expenses including rent and utilities costs.

2019-20 fundraising and membership income is detailed further below.

Fundraising Summary

Fundraising efforts were also hampered this year by the pandemic. Most of the income came from ASF donations, as mentioned above, and ticket sales for the \$2000 draw, which was postponed in January 2020.



Further detail on this year's fundraising activities is provided below. This list does not include sponsorship, grants or donations, which totalled almost \$80,000.
